

Second Meeting of the Sustainable Energy for All Advisory Board United Nations Headquarters 26-27 November 2013 Summary

Background

On 27 November 2013, UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon and World Bank President Jim Yong Kim convened the second meeting of the Sustainable Energy for All Advisory Board in New York City. This second meeting consisted of a formal session, preceded by a panel discussion on financing, an official high-level dinner, and a technical session. The proceedings ended with a formal closing luncheon. In parallel, the General Assembly Open Working Group on Sustainable Development Goals convened a meeting to discuss the role of energy in the Post-2015 Development Agenda.

The Advisory Board, consisting of a distinguished set of leaders from the private sector, public sector, and civil society, provides strategic guidance, while serving as global ambassadors for the initiative, conducting high-level advocacy for action on energy and mobilizing stakeholders on behalf of the Sustainable Energy for All initiative (SE4ALL). The members of the Advisory Board are listed in Annex 1; Attendees are listed in Annex 2, and the Final Meeting Agenda is listed in Annex 3.

Opening Remarks

In his opening remarks, UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon described how energy, as a key element of sustainable development, weaves together poverty reduction, social justice and environmental protection. In this regard, he emphasized the pressing need for a global transformational shift to clean, efficient and affordable energy for all, and urged Advisory Board members, as global ambassadors for SE4ALL, to accelerate movement within five specific areas: 1. Finance; 2. Energy access; 3. Energy efficiency; 4. Renewable energy; and, 5. Placing energy at the heart of the post 2015 development agenda. He announced his intention to convene a high-level partners meeting on Sustainable Energy for All in June 2014.

President Kim of the World Bank emphasized that "Financing is the key to achieving these objectives," and added that to reach the goals for access to energy, energy efficiency, and renewable energy, an additional \$600-\$800 billion a year from now to 2030 will need to be mobilized. In this regard, Mr. Kim said, it will be important for SE4ALL to take action now through the myriad of business models, financing

instruments, and resources available; he emphasized leveraging public and private finance using risk mitigation instruments. He also urged Board members to commit to scaling existing success stories, while coming together to identify the bankable projects the world needs and create new deals.

Dr. Kandeh Yumkella, Special Representative of the Secretary-General and Chief Executive Officer of Sustainable Energy for All, in his progress report, highlighted the initiative's achievements to date: continued commitments and actions from governments, private sector and civil society, as well as clear and vocal political support from Member States to place energy at the center of the Post-2015 Development agenda.

To continue to build on the current momentum, he outlined five immediate priorities: 1. Ensure a well functioning Global Facilitation Team (GFT); 2. Help SE4All partners accelerate country-level actions and High-Impact Opportunities to meet agreed goals and targets; 3. Establish the long-term institutional arrangements for SE4ALL; 4. Ensure continued robust engagement with the post-2015 and SDG processes; and 5. Enhance both internal and external communications.

As the Chair of the Executive Committee, Mr. Chad Holliday fully endorsed the priorities laid out by Dr. Yumkella. He emphasized, in line with the Secretary-General's statement, that efforts would need to be redoubled, especially within financing, and challenged Board members to consider how the Board could be organized to facilitate an accelerated pace to reach the overall objectives.

Summary of Discussions

Scaling-up Finance for Access, Efficiency and Renewables: Board members stressed that funding opportunities already exist, with large financing for renewable energy and adaptation already being achieved. Bankable/viable projects, however, must continually be identified, and the private sector must be involved. Other members emphasized that attention needs to be directed towards work at the rural level and the users within communities. SE4ALL should identify and work with the biggest opportunities for impact. It is necessary to improve the enabling environment: Leadership at country level is important for the sustainability of our efforts; leaders must be encouraged to communicate and be transparent, governance of utilities is critical as this is linked to the viability of many projects, country policy must support agenda for progress. The Country Action work already being undertaken is proceeding well with 81 developing country partners partnering with SE4ALL. However, it is important to bring some of the initial countries to the stage of seeking financing during 2014.

Mobilizing Actions: Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy: Discussion was opened with some members asserting that energy efficiency and renewables are "low-hanging fruits". Experience has shown that these technologies can create new jobs and economic growth and be profitable for society and for the consumer, but they have not

scaled to the level possible due to a lack of an enabling environment. A combination of standards, incentives, and best practices is needed. The energy efficiency hub in Copenhagen has the opportunity to identify best practices to scale these efforts, drawing on initiatives that already exist. Actionable ideas were suggested: Increase efficiency performance standards, improve efficiency standards for trucks, reduce gas flaring, and increase construction of efficient power plants while improving efficiency of other plants. It is important to measure the health benefits associated with the hree SE4ALL goals.

Catalyzing Action from the Advisory Board: Board members agreed to establish four dedicated committees, with short timeframes, to focus efforts of the Advisory Board and accelerate progress. Committees will be established on 1. Financing; 2. Access; 3. Efficiency; and, 4. Renewable Energy. The Advisory Board has agreed to take on this challenge and report back at the high-level partners meeting on Sustainable Energy for All, which the Secretary-General will convene in June 2014.

Side events

A number of related events took place in conjunction with the formal proceedings of the Advisory Board. Key points from the events are listed below:

High-level Dinner: Sustainable energy must be at the heart of the Post-2015 Development Agenda. SE4ALL has enormous potential to create the transformational changes needed.

General Assembly Open Working Group on Sustainable Development Goals: Energy is an enabler for development and is linked to all dimensions of sustainable development. Universal access to modern energy services enjoys broad support as a target. The Sustainable Energy for All initiative contains ambitious but feasible targets for universal energy access, for renewable energy and for energy efficiency.

Finance panel: At present, there are US\$130 trillion of capital available in global capital markets yet barely \$0.4 trillion of these resources are flowing to energy. There are many barriers that prevent the flow of resources to emerging market energy projects, including lack of understanding of the opportunities, limited capacity to appraise risks, limited appetite for risk, lack of creditworthiness of energy utilities, and limited leveraging of concessional resources. The finance targets of SE4ALL are achievable, but new ideas must continue to be leveraged to achieve the investments needed. Ideas discussed included: project origination, leveraging of public finances, the importance of utility reform, and the use of creativity in financial markets such as the use of aggregation vehicles for securitization.

High-level Luncheon: Momentum politically and on the ground continues to build. Commitments and actions were announced by Brazil, Japan, UN Foundation (Energy

Practitioners Network), Friends of Sustainable Energy for All, Bloomberg New Energy Finance, Novozymes, Shell, GEF, United Kingdom, Norway, UN OHRLLS.

- Configuration of the four Advisory Board committees, including agreement on Terms of Reference, timeline and deliverables.

- Advisory Board committees initiate work.

- Advisory Board committees stocktaking.
